Hanscom Middle School Bridge Program Proposal

Program Description

The Bridge Program will be flexible program that can serve general and special education students in a wide range of service delivery. This program can provide services ranging from full inclusion to substantially separate programming with the opportunity for inclusion in areas most appropriate to individual student needs-flexibility of programming. It will have the following core program foundations:

- Co-taught instruction with general and special education teacher
 - Lead Teacher would be Special Education Teacher
 - Content Teachers will be Certified in Content Area
- Emotional and Behavioral support and interventions
- Communication, social skills and academic supports to access the general education curriculum for increased opportunity to make effective progress within inclusion setting
- Frequent home communication and individual quarterly progress meetings with providers

There may be no more than 12 students in this program under Special Education Laws and Regulations 603 CMR 28.06 (d) and there cannot be an age range greater than 48 months 603 CMR 28.06 (g).

Bridge Program Student Needs

Students entering the program may have needs in the following areas:

- Specifically designed instruction to access academics
- Development in social skills and pragmatics
- Guidance with navigating social situations
- Assistance to develop skills around middle school transitions in the school day
- Discrete direction around following routines
- Access to support and skill development with emotional and behavioral needs
- Specifically designed instruction for regulating behaviors and/or utilizing coping strategies

Why do we need to have in-district programming at Hanscom?

- Ability to provide in-district programming leads to students receiving their education within the least restrictive environment
- Increase the ability to have a continuum of services
- In-district programming allows for our students to remain in their home school
- Provides students with community-based educational opportunities
- Provides access to inclusion within the general education classroom

Bridge Program Timeline Focus

2023-2024

- Current 6th grade students who may require substantially separate programming and significant support within the general education setting to access learning and social-emotional supports
- Unknown transitions can be supported at middle school level in a comprehensive programmatic way
- Focus on core aspects of program development

2024-2025

- Anticipate more students transitioning into district or into middle school who may require this level of programming
- Consideration for multi-grade level programming
- Focus on evaluation of programming and ongoing needs for program development
